APPRENTICESHIPS

School and College Resources

This edition has a big focus on considering, searching for and applying to apprenticeships. National Apprenticeship week took place on the week commencing 6th February and during this time many companies kick off their apprenticeship recruitment schemes. We have timed this edition to bring you as much information as possible to help those that may be interested.

Apprenticeships are now available in a range of industries both for school leavers after year 11 and year 13 but also for students who want to re-focus at year 12. They are not necessarily for everyone and thorough career research and access to guidance will help young people to understand and identify if it is the right path for them and their career ambitions, as there are still many jobs and careers that require the traditional path of university or are not yet available as an apprenticeship.

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This week students have been learning about the different types of apprenticeships in their year 10 and 11 tutor periods and below you can see what they have been learning about apprenticeships.

What is an Apprenticeship?

As an apprentice you work for an employer Get paid to work and undergo a period of training where you will learn a particular workplace skill or set of skills Work towards a qualification which you can use to access future jobs Apprenticeships last between 1 and 5 years Apprenticeships can go onto a further level of training or secure a job in a relevant industry Guaranteed at least £4.81 per hour be earning in the region of £150 to £260 per week for an advanced apprenticeship Salaries for higher apprenticeships usually progresses year on year starting between £7-20K and completing on £18 to £26K Apprenticeship

LABOUR MARKET INFORMATION

What is Labour Market Information

Labour Market Information (LMI) is information about what is happening in a labour market. LMI tends to focus on the industries that are growing and declining, the types and levels of jobs are increasing and decreasing and what supply of labour is available – numbers, skill and qualification levels.

Why do students need to know Local labour market information (LMI)?

LMI enables students to consider all aspects of employment with relations to the economy and how it operates. Career map recently partnered with Education and Employers to release a study which highlighted the disconnection between young people's career goals and the jobs available in the UK. It was reported that young people who had access to labour market information made career goals which were better connected to the UK job market.

LMI can be used by students for a clearer understanding of trends, structure and economic demand. It also provides a forecast for the future of specific industries based on current and previous trends and demographics. This information is invaluable for young people and can help them find a career which is right for them in a competitive job market.



LMI also provides students with time for reflection when choosing their next steps after school or college. For certain occupations, going to university may be the only option to break into the industry, whereas for others, an <u>apprenticeship</u> may provide equal opportunities. This enables young people to fully consider their options and to make a decision based on what is right for them, connected with their career aspirations.

JOB OF THE MONTH - BUSINESS ANALYST

What Does a Business Analyst Do?

The answer is – it varies. In different companies, business analysts carry out different activities. But here are some of the most common business analyst roles and responsibilities.

Business analysts analyse the performance of a particular segment in a company. Very often, they engage with the analysis of different processes, defining goals, and formulating hypotheses. Their effort is to optimise the performance of the particular segment of the company they have been assigned to.

They not only collect data but also apply data-driven decision making, communicate findings, and oversee the implementation of these findings. What's more, business analysts often conduct training for non-technical team members.



How much does a business analyst make?

According to the data, the salaries of candidates in this role range from a low of £43,427 to a high of £120,630, with a median salary of £74,791.

What are the Business Analyst Career Pathways?

A business analyst job is a great option to explore, both on its own and as the first step on the career ladder to becoming a Product Lead, Head of Product, or Head of Division, and, why not a VP. Most middle and large companies across all industries - including Consulting, Finance, and Tech - offer full-time business analyst positions.

Consultancy is also very popular for this profession, especially in smaller organisations. However, this option provides a business analyst with a limited view of the business compared to their counterparts employed by a company in a specific industry.



What Business Analyst Skills You Need to Acquire?


We researched 1,395 business analyst jobs to discover the desired tools and skills business analyst candidates must have:

- Business management skills
- Analytical thinking skills
- Knowledge of teaching and the ability to design courses
- To be flexible and open to change
- · The ability to use your initiative
- Customer service skills
- The ability to work well with others
- Excellent verbal communication skills
- To have a thorough understanding of computer systems and application



What Is the Required Business Analyst Degree?

In terms of business analyst education, 66% of the job posts require a Bachelor's degree. This is the standard for this profession.



What Is the Necessary Business Analyst Experience?

Most employers sampled required an average of 4 years on the job. However, 35% of job ads were also suitable for people with no prior working experience.
